

Village News

Winter? What winter! The guys have been taking advantage of the good weather and doing some maintenance. The kitchen of the Hatchery House was painted as well as the dining room ceiling. We had a roof leak (fixed with our new roof) and Trace Crothers did the repair work over Christmas break. Benches are being repaired and painted. Never a dull moment is spent.

Village Plans

Here are the on deck plans for spring, or rather, mid March. In the interest of time and money, we have decided to make phase 2 of the Watchpocket building one story instead of two. The outside will look like a couple more storefronts, but inside will be a Multi-purpose Learning Center with the Children of the American Revolution (CAR) Hands-on History area. This is a fancy name for a nice big room that we can hold meetings and workshops in, have rotating displays, and do anything else we need room for. Paige Daniel, past State President of the Michigan Society, Children of the American Revolution, has raised and donated \$3000.00 to the project. She will outfit the Hands-on History area with historical toys and items for children to use. The family of Gerald Lewis contributed \$1,200.00 as a memorial to Mr. Lewis, a teacher for 40 years. Gary Wall is in charge of the project and will lead the pack.

Meanwhile, we have the opportunity to move the Bicentennial Log Cabin from the grounds of the Drayton Plains Nature Center and turn it into a Blacksmith Shop on our grounds. This cabin was started in 1975 by Charles Welsh and students at Riverside Elementary School on our grounds at Fish Hatchery Park (right in front of our current Jacober's Store). Built to commemorate the Nation's Bicentennial, it was finished in 1976. We think it was 1981 when it was moved to the Nature Center. What a great opportunity to preserve and showcase this unbelievable slice of history in our Village.

In order to put the Bicentennial Log Cabin between Jacober's Store and the Carriage House, we need to move the sheds. The barn like wood shed will be moved between Nelson's Filling Station and the Lohff Print Shop. It will be revamped to represent a shoe shop. Waterford Village proper (Andersonville & Dixie) had a shoe shop in the 1840's kept by Charles W. Harback, who also kept a tavern. We have many shoe making artifacts to outfit a small

shop and represent this early business in Waterford.

Next up will be a one-room schoolhouse slated for the spring of 2013. This gives us time to raise funds and do the proper research for a design. Waterford had eleven one-room schoolhouses and we would like to replicate one of them.

The dust is not settling under our feet. In fact, sometimes we feel like we are moving buildings like on a Monopoly board. We are moving as fast as our volunteers and money will take us. Anyone interested in helping out in any way just let us know or show up on a Wednesday. It is taking a village to build this Village!

Waterford Center School



Waterford Center Elementary School was on the corner of Pontiac Lake and Airport Roads across from the Waterford Center Cemetery. It was built in 1869 as a one-room schoolhouse for the price of \$1,900.00. In an effort to upgrade the school system in the 1920's, certain standards were set up for the county schools. A metal plate bearing the words "Standard School" was awarded when these requirements were met-and often times, Waterford Center did not measure up. Sometimes, when repairs had been made, it was found that the well wasn't adequate or the dictionary was too old or the maps were out of date. It was a scramble to stay ahead. In 1927, a new two-story four-room schoolhouse was built almost directly in back. In later years, it was used as the Waterford School District Administration building and is now a private church.

The Old Mill Tavern Hotel

No place was more beloved in Waterford than the Old Mill Tavern. Built right on the Dixie across from where Andersonville Road meets, it was an icon for years. And though people remember the fine food served at the establishment, many do not know the restaurant started as a Tavern and hotel. This article was written years ago by Dorothy White, daughter of Louis Dorman.

Note: italics are recent clarifications

The hotel was built by Louis Dorman who had leased the Waterford Hotel in 1922 along with his father Emanuel Dorman. *(The Waterford Hotel was on the southwest corner of Dixie and Andersonville Road and served as a stagecoach stop during the 1830's.)* They conducted business there while they started building the Old Mill. It was an exceptionally large building and was built as the funds became available which slowed the building.

In the early years we lived in the Waterford Hotel and when the Old Mill was done we moved into the rooms in the upstairs of the Old Mill. Mother Jennie Dorman was the cook along with other employees my dad had hired.

The family consisted of my brother Louis Jr., who was the eldest, then my sister Margaret, another sister Elaine (deceased) and last me, Dorothy. We lived in the hotel until 1931, when dad built a house on the other side of the river.

The restaurant in those early days was very formal compared to today's eating places. People dressed up in their very best to eat out. Dad was the first restaurant owner in the county to get a liquor, beer and wine license. Before that *(during Prohibition)* he did make trips to the Detroit River to pick up Canadian liquor. It was the late 1920s and we kids would go down with him to the boats. Big Boxes would come down from the boats. They would load the car up and cover the boxes with blankets. When they were through, we kids would sit on the boxes. We were the cover for the liquor. He also took us to the Eastern Market where he bought meat and other needs for the hotel.

It wasn't until years later that I realized that we had been decoys. It was all o.k., though, because after all, the bootlegger was my dad!

Prohibition was a joke to most of the country and Waterford Township was no different. My dad would

serve the booze in teacups. The Sheriff from Flint even frequented the Old Mill. However, if the Sheriff from Pontiac was coming, dad would get a warning. He once locked my brother up in the attic with the booze when the Pontiac Sheriff arrived unexpectedly. When Prohibition ended, Mr. Dorman was the first restaurant owner in Oakland County to get a liquor, beer and wine license.

The 1920's were a busy time as Waterford was known as a resort destination. There were four trains a day coming out from Detroit and people would come out to spend the weekend. The Waterford Hotel, The Old Mill Tavern Hotel, and the Windiate Hotel located on Lotus Lake were there for travelers seeking lodging.

The depression years were not easy. There were times when the cash register was empty. The automotive executives and their co-workers from Flint and Pontiac were our best customers.

The Old Mill was highly recommended by Duncan Hines who wrote a book on the best restaurants in the country. In the late thirties dad had floor shows every Saturday night obtained from an agent in Detroit. There would be singers, dancers, magicians, etc. We always had our own dance band with six or more members. For many years we had Irene Bader at the piano and people loved to have dinner and sing with Irene.

Everyone in the family worked. My brother Louis did all kinds of work from dishes to bartender and manager. My sister Mag was a cook and my sister Elaine ran the office and I assisted her once in a great while. My mother gave up cooking in the 1930's and dad hired cooks and bakers.

The Dorman family sold the Old Mill in the 1970's. The restaurant had three different owners and burned down in 1982.
