
#### Sleeper Yo-Yo

The yo-yo dates back to ancient Greece and was used in England, France, and other European countries. It was also known as a "Bandelure" or winding toy and, in England, a "Prince of Wales" toy. Today, most yo-yos are made from either wood or plastic, but they have also been made from gold, silver, and animal horn.

#### Cup and Ball Toss Toy

Toss toys date back to ancient Greece. The Cup and Ball Toss Toy was played with in Colonial America and is mentioned in an 1834 publication for girls. It is similar to, but much easier than the Bilboquet, which has the ball landing on a pointed stick instead of inside a cup. Do not let this toy fool you; it takes good hand dexterity to get the ball in the cup!





#### Finger Tops


This top is an authentic reproduction of an early 19th-century spinning, wooden top. Tops come in many different shapes and sizes and have various names like Peg Top, Humming Top, Whip Top, Spinning Top, and Finger Top. Some are used with string; others just have a long round stem like this Finger Top, for spinning between the thumb and first finger. Play with two tops and see which top spins the longest.

#### Jacob's Ladder

The Jacob's Ladder toy dates back to Pilgrim times in the New World and this toy was allowed to be played with on Sunday by the Puritan children because of its biblical reference (Genesis 28:12). Jacob was on a journey and had a dream about angels moving up and down a ladder between heaven and earth.

Other Sunday toys included the Handkerchief Doll (church doll), Noah's Ark, Whirlygog, Pillars of Solomon, Wolf in Sheep's Clothing, and the Buzz Saw.


The Jacob's Ladder toy is still enjoyed today by both children and adults as a "nice quiet toy".




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#### **Buzz Saw**

The buzz Saw is one of the most popular noisemakers of all times! Native Americans made "buzzers" from a circular piece of bone or antler and used sinew instead of string. Colonial children played with buzz saws. This type of noisemaker was also known as "button on a string" during the Victorian Period and later. A very large button from mother's sewing basket could be strung for this toy. Coins, bamboo, stones, and seashells have also been used to make this toy. Tin was even used, and teeth were cut around the circumference so that the disc would shred a piece of paper when the two come into contact. Made this way, it resembles a circular saw blade, and this is where it got the name Buzz Saw. Other names for the Buzz Saw are Whizzer, Whiligig, Whirligig, Moonwinder, and Skyewinder.





#### "T" Puzzle

The "T" Puzzle was first used in advertising in the early 1900's. One of the oldest "T" puzzles is thought to be the one that was included with a box of White Rose Ceylon Tea distributed by Seeman Brothers of New York in 1903. The puzzle had four parts and had printing on the longest part. "Arrange these four pieces of cardboard so as to form a perfect T. White Rose Ceylon is a perfect Tea," said the tea company. One piece depicts a cup of steaming tea. Below are three of the actual pieces from this puzzle. A reference to the T-puzzle appears in "Carpentry & Mechanics for Boys", published by A. Neely Hall in 1918. Hall's description states, "The T-Puzzle, a famous old puzzle, is more difficult to assemble than it looks."

#### What's a Michigander?

#### Highway lines were invented here!

We have Edward Hines to thank, who came up with the idea in 1911. He lobbied the state Legislature to give responsibility for roads to counties instead of townships and cities, a measure that was eventually adopted.

As a Wayne County road commissioner, Haines lobbied for long-lasting concrete roads

instead of gravel or asphalt.

His brilliant idea came to him as he watched a leaky milk wagon drip a strip of milk down a dusty road and thought something like, "Hey! If we painted lines on our good concrete roads, drivers would know where the middle is!" It's hard to imagine navigating Michigan roads without help from Hines.
