Drayton Plains History Briefs

Little is known about a man by the name of Foster who first settled near this area about 1822 but Jonathan Perry and Harvey and Austin Durfee were first to make their homes at "The Plains". William Van Ostrand came in 1836. Daniel Windiate, who brought the first shorthorn cattle, Berkshire hogs and Hampshire sheep to Michigan, named the settlement "Drayton Plains" after his home in England.

The first post office was on a site which later became the Michigan Bass Hatchery. Early businessmen were Moses Southard, blacksmith; William Beasley (son-in-law of Daniel Windiate), general store; and James Swartz, boots and shoes.

When the Grand Trunk Railroad came through Pontiac to Waterford in 1856, supplies were brought in by a wood-burning locomotive. Later, ice from Pittman & Dean's ice House on Loon Lake was shipped out by rail.

The first school in District 8 was a frame building which stood east of the cemetery in Section 10. Lewis M. Covert was the first teacher 1837-38.

Legend for Map:

1-The Drayton Plains one room school was located on the site of the present school. When the latter was erected, the old frame building was moved across Sashabaw Road and in 1965 was again moved to the Pontiac Pinegrove property, historic home of former Governor Moses Wisner.

2-Linabury Stable, owned by John Linabury, built 1865.

3-Old Drayton Plains Hotel, built 1838 by Daniel Windiate.

4-Cider Mill built in 1860's, John Kirodot & Sons owners.

5-Judd's General Store which also served as post office, election hall, Sunday School and Saturday night dance hall, later housed Meinrad Hangee's tin shop.

6-P. Shwesigner manufactured boots and shoes and sold general merchandise in his store.

7-Thomas Hugill was an early blacksmith who included carriage ironing in his trade.

8-The Depot, trains brought passengers and coal to the community. C. B. Albertson was station agent and postmaster in 1870.

9-Pittman and Dean Ice House. Ice, cut by a plow with a sharp blade on their 40-acre surface of Loon Lake, was preserved in sheds insulated with saw dust. Hand cars were loaded with ice and taken by track to the railroad. By 1883, the community boasted two other ice companies-Belle Isle and Silver Lake.

10-Grist Mill, built in 1835 by Daniel Windiate. From this spot, the bridge, which carried Mill Street (now Hatchery Road), can still be seen.

11-This part of Saginaw Trail was retained when the turnpike was straightened out on the north side of the tracks to become Dixie Highway.

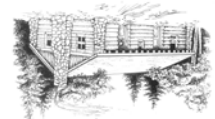
